Winter Forum - The State of Our Valley, 2020

When Lukas Haynes, Executive Director of the David Rockefeller Fund, spoke at our Winter Forum two years ago, he defined "strategic philanthropy" as an approach that begins by identifying goals in an area of charitable giving. Our "State of the Valley, 2020" Winter Forum on January 13, aimed to foster members' awareness of what those goals might be. About eighty members and their guests attended. Four outstanding panelists – Erin Pfaeffle from St. Luke's Community Health; Dani Southard of the National Forest Foundation; Kristen Poole from Sun Valley Center for the Arts; and Heather Crocker from Blaine County Schools – briefly summarized some of the big issues facing our community, including those involving physical and mental health; recreation and our changing environment; the high costs of the visual and performing arts, and some of the Community Library expertly facilitated this education event. Many thanks to Louisa Moats, Chair of the Education Committee and Committee members, Susan Passovoy, Jeanne Cassell, Lilian Wu, Jenni Riley, Chris Vik, Kathleen Alley, Susan Giannettino, and Mardi Shepard for arranging this successful and informative event.

WRWF Grants - Update

The 2020 Grants season has officially begun!

In December, we received forty-two applications through our SlideRoom website. The grant requests from these applications total \$895,771, the largest amount request we have ever received. Eight nonprofits are first time applicants to WRWF. During the first week of January, the Application Review Committee (ARC) met to discuss the applications and determine if they should advance to the Grant Sub-committees for further evaluation and site visits. The ARC verifies that the grant applications meet the WRWF criteria and timeline. After a long, six-hour meeting, the committee advanced thirty-seven applications to the five Grant Sub-committees.

This year we have over sixty-five WRWF members who are working on the Grants Committee. These members will be meeting to discuss the grant requests as well as coordinate site visits with the nonprofits to further evaluate the applications. This work is done during the months of January and February. At the end of February, all of the grant volunteers will meet to determine which grant requests will be advanced to the final grant presentations and be placed on the ballot. The nonprofit presentations to our members will be held on Wednesday, March 4 from 1:00-5:00 PM at The Community Library. If you are unable to attend the March presentations, you may view it through our livestream feed. We will send you a link along with the ballot on March 5.

2019 WRWF Endowment Update

The generosity of WRWF members continues to amaze; in 2019, donors committed another \$45,000 to the WRWF Endowment Fund. From its inception in November 2017 with pledges of \$100,000, the value of the Endowment has grown to an impressive \$725,000. In just two short years, Endowment donors have created a thriving fund that is driving greater WRWF impacts.

The Endowment Fund has been established with a long-term approach in order to provide a stable income stream to support the operating needs of the WRWF. To date, distributions of \$20,000 were made in 2018, and \$25,000 in 2019. These funds enable the WRWF to provide the support and programming that underlie our mission of educating women philanthropists and making positive change in the community. Thank you to all of you who have contributed to the Endowment Fund!

All of the required governance for the Endowment Fund was put in place by the WRWF Board in March 2017; the Investment Policy Statement details the investment program and the spending policy.

New Procedures for Dues Payments

In an attempt to reduce costs, we have moved our accounting system in-house. By doing so, we have immediate and accurate financial information available to us so that we can make informed decisions at any point in time. We believe this new system increases our compliance with government entities, our accountability and our transparency.

We have setup an online payment processing system to accept credit cards rather than using PayPal or the ICF credit card processing system as we have done in the past.

When paying your annual dues this year, or any additional donations you might make to the WRWF, members or donors will now make their checks out to the Wood River Women's Foundation or to the WRWF. The donation portion of your payment will be forwarded to ICF who will continue to manage our funds and make our grant distributions. We will maintain our positive relationship with ICF during this transition process and beyond.
