

#### **Education**

Jim Foudy Superintendent Blaine County School District

Jim Foudy joined the Blaine County School District with twentyfive years of service to Idaho Schools. Most recently, Foudy served the McCall-Donnelly School District as superintendent from 2015-2021. Prior to that, he served as an elementary school principal and was a former elementary school teacher. Foudy is a strong proponent of community and family engagement, with an emphasis on consensus building and strategic initiatives. He is a member of the American Association of School Administrators, the Idaho Association of School Administrators and the Idaho Superintendent Network. Foudy and his wife Alison have four children. The youngest two are proud to attend Blaine County Schools today.



The Blaine County School District serves the cities of Bellevue, Carey, Hailey, Ketchum, Sun Valley and their surrounding areas. The District includes four elementary schools, one middle school, one high school, one alternative high school, and one K-12 school. #### **Environment**

Josh Johnson Central Idaho Conservation Associate Idaho Conservation League

Josh Johnson is a conservation associate for the Idaho Conservation League (ICL), based in their Ketchum office. His academic background is in geology, with a B.A. from Middlebury College and M.S. from University of Colorado. Prior to ICL, Johnson worked in the environmental education field as a park ranger and interpretive guide throughout the West. He has been at ICL for 4 1/2 years and his work spans public lands issues, mining, and water quality. Johnson spends his free time skiing, trail running, and backpacking in the mountains around the Wood River Valley.



The Idaho Conservation League (ICL) is a statewide environmental advocacy organization founded in 1973. With over 11,000 members and offices in Boise, Ketchum, McCall, and Sandpoint, ICL works to protect the air you breathe, the water you drink and the wild places you and your family love. ICL currently has major campaigns focused on protecting Idaho's public lands, combating climate change, restoring water quality in southern Idaho's Snake River, and bringing back Idaho's wild salmon and steelhead.



### Housing

Michelle Griffith Executive Director ARCH Community Housing Trust

Michelle Griffith has been the Executive Director of ARCH since 2009. Prior to working for ARCH she lived with her husband and two sons in various foreign countries including England, Russia and Venezuela. Since working for ARCH, Griffith has overseen the development of over 150 housing units throughout the Wood River Valley. She represents Idaho on the Affordable Housing Board of the Federal Home Loan Bank of Des Moines. Griffith is President of the Sun Valley City Council and sits on the Board of Fly Sun Valley Alliance.



ARCH is a housing development organization committed to creating permanently affordable housing solutions in Blaine County. ARCH delivers all stages of development including site selection, construction oversight and property management. In a decade of experience ARCH has created over 150 workforce housing units to remain affordable in perpetuity so that teachers, first responders, healthcare workers, and other aspiring families can become part of our local community, which benefits us all.



#### Recreation

Mark Davidson Executive Director Blaine County Recreation District

Mark Davidson is the Executive Director of the Blaine County Recreation District (BCRD). Prior to working for BCRD, Davidson worked in conservation throughout Idaho for more than 18 years, for The Nature Conservancy and Trout Unlimited. Davidson grew up in Jerome, Idaho, where he participated in Jerome County Recreation District programs. He has lived in the Wood River Valley since 2000.



Since 1976, Blaine County Recreation District (BCRD), has provided healthy, active, and diverse recreational opportunities for everyone in our community. BCRD is the largest recreational provider in Blaine County, serving over 600,000 annual visits and enrollments by residents and visitors of all ages, abilities, and socioeconomic backgrounds. From Youth Sports to after-school programming, and the Aquatic Center, to over 200 kilometers of groomed Nordic skiing and snowshoeing, and from Galena Lodge to the Wood River Trail, BCRD provides opportunities for healthy and active recreation throughout our community.

Wendy Jaquet Former Idaho State Representative


Wendy Jaquet is a former member of the Idaho House of Representatives where she served several terms as Minority Leader, leading the Democratic caucus in the Idaho House (1994-2012). She served on the Joint Financial and Appropriations, Health and Welfare, and the Energy, Environment and Technology Committees, among others.


Prior to serving in the Idaho Legislature, Jaquet was the Executive Director of the Sun Valley-Ketchum Chamber of Commerce during a period of membership and financial success.

Jaquet serves on the Idaho Board of Health and Welfare (2013-currently), Co-Chaired the Governor's State Complete Count Committee (census 2019-2020), and currently serves on the Andrus Policy Center, the Common Sense American Idaho Advisory Committee, the WWAMI Idaho Advisory Committee, and the College of Southern Idaho Hailey advisory board.

Jaquet has organized several city-to-city tours including an upcoming one to McCall and is volunteering in the art room at the Sun Valley Museum of Art. She is a retired adjunct professor at Boise State University where she taught and took graduate classes and served on the Faculty Senate. Jaquet is a University of Washington Political Science major with a graduate degree in Public Administration.

#### Question: How has your organization accommodated the growth in our community?



"Due to an increase in the use of our services, we expanded our grant writing efforts to obtain more funds to meet urgent needs.

This includes keeping people stably housed by providing a higher level of rent assistance and other types of financial aid to help survivors of abuse meet other urgent needs. We significantly expanded our transitional housing program by building 18 new apartments to address the demand. We added another victim advocate staff position to better accommodate the increased need for assistance to people in our community."

"Growth should give us more singers/ volunteers. However, COVID has kept us from doing outreach. We are doing very little singing in person."



"As more people have moved here during the pandemic, it has impacted the housing market, forcing some locals out of their rentals. Many homeowners who were renting decided to take



advantage of the high selling prices, negatively impacting our workforce who can no longer afford to live here. As a nonprofit focused on basic needs, the number of people we serve has doubled from what it was two years ago."



"We've experienced an increased number of participants, and now offer a greater number of types of programs."

"As a large festival with events in outdoor spaces, we welcome new people and can happily accommodate them!"

Wood River Women's Foundation inspires and educates women to become leaders in philanthropy. We encourage and create significant positive change in our community through pooled grantmaking.
